

The Lych Gate was re-thatched in 2010 with the generous support of a grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund. Children from the local school learnt about the work of the Thatcher and produced art work using the thatching straw as inspiration.

The building has been re-thatched four times in the last forty years. Methods of re-thatching now have changed little since the previous picture was taken in 1955.



The Parish Church of St Peter & St Paul is open for visitors every day of the year from 10.00am until dusk. Its history, dating from the 13th century, is explained in a leaflet that is available within the church.

Set in a delightful area of the Cotswolds Long Compton encourages visitors, who will find B&Bs, provisions in the local shops south of the church and refreshments, meals and accommodation at the Red Lion pub, half a mile south.
